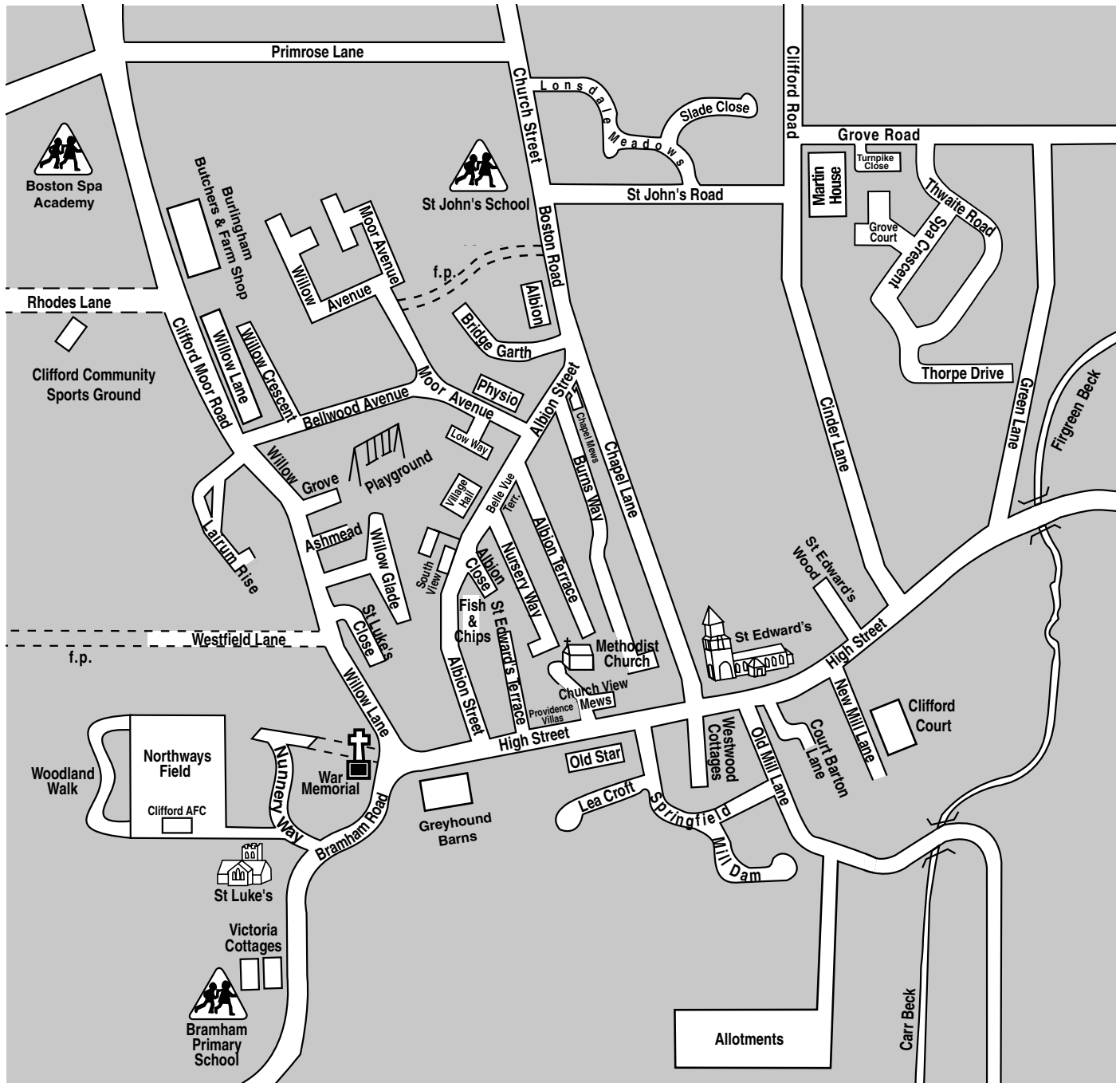

From the Parish Council Meeting on 20th July 2022

Public Participation The public are entitled to be present at any Parish Council Meeting and the public participation session allows them to raise any issues about the parish. The agenda, and minutes of past meeting, are available at www.cliffordparishcouncil.gov.uk

The Parish Council meets at 7.30 at Clifford Village Hall. The meeting dates for 2022 are: 19th January, 16th February, 16th March, 20th April, 18th May, 15th June, 20th July, August – no meeting, 21st September, 19th October, 16th November and 21st December.

Queen Elizabeth II 1926 – 2022

Clifford Parish Council joined the nation in mourning the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II after 70 years of service.

A Book of Condolence was made available at the Village Hall for residents to sign.

The September Council meeting was cancelled due to the restrictions on Council meetings, and giving notice of such meetings, during the official period of mourning

The Traffic Management Working Group is pursuing the option of establishing a safe walking route from St Luke's Church to Bramham Primary School. The hedge adjacent to the footpath towards the school is encroaching onto the path making it very narrow in places. The Council is investigating the options to significantly reduce the width of the hedge without damaging it.

LCC Highways

The Council is aware that there are several scheduled highways works across the Wetherby Ward that are outstanding, including the improvements to the footpath to Bramham Primary School. The work to the footpath was not undertaken during the summer holidays as planned and the Council understands that it will now be undertaken in the October half term.

The Council has raised concerns with LCC Highways about flooding at the junction of Albion Street and Chapel Lane due to blocked gullies and flooding at the junction of St John's Road and Cinder Lane due to runoff water from the field. A substantive response from LCC is awaited.

One of the Speed Indication Devices by Bramham Primary School is currently with the manufacturers for repair and will be replaced as soon as possible.

St Edwards Wood

Replacement gates have been installed at the entrance to St Edwards Woods. This area is very popular with dog walkers and residents are reminded that, whilst dogs do not need to be kept on a lead, they should be always kept under control. Please remember to clean up after your dog as well.

OUT AND ABOUT IN CLIFFORD

Music Festival

It seems Arctic Monkeys finished off the Leeds Festival with a sing-song. If so, we didn't hear much of it in Clifford. Indeed, there was little music (or as some in the community would say – noise!) to be heard at all during the 3 days of the event. It's usual for some bass notes to reach us through the ground arriving as muffled thuds - sometimes mistaken as seismologists doing a bit of experimental work. So, what was different this year? Was it something to do with wind directions which were mostly from the east or south-east during the event? They would certainly carry the sound away from us. Anyhow no-one begrudges the dry weather which the crowds enjoyed over the weekend. We are desperate for rain but three more days without rain was a small extension to our drought.

At last – a thunderstorm

On the early hours of 5th September, about 3 a.m. a thunderstorm broke out running for about 20 mins and seemingly nearly overhead. There was heavy rain for about 30 mins and 9mm was registered on a rain gauge. Before that we had a grand total of only 2.5 cm (an inch in old money) since when nobody can remember. It's puzzling that so many forecasts of thunder have come to nothing. What is it about Clifford that we have had no rain even when areas just a few miles away have been drenched?

The long dryness has been illustrated in several ways. At the Northways woodland walk there is a definite layer of crunchy leaves not usually seen in early September. It reflects what the botanists have been saying – that many deciduous trees are dropping leaves early as a response to the lengthy dry period. Blackberries have ripened unusually in August this year. Not far from Northways on the west hedge of the graveyard there has been a beautiful, luscious crop. Meanwhile, our local beck – Carr or Fir Green depending which bit of the map you read – continues to flow through though at lower levels. There must still be aquifers with a supply of water well down beneath us. Have the Tadcaster breweries had any problems?

Bus timetable digital display

The digital display is a bit tricky to follow if you are not familiar with it. Be aware that if it displays a time in the format such as **17:35** it is only showing the scheduled time as appears on the timetable; it doesn't mean that the bus is on its way and will arrive at that time. For a bus that is on its way, the format is something like **6 min** with the number getting lower until the legend '**Due**' appears.

A couple waiting for the No. 7 bus on the last Saturday of August found they had a wait of one hour for the next bus after the one they had gone for did not materialise. They were expected to understand that the flip from one time to the next hour on was telling them it was cancelled. Why can't they have a 'cancelled' legend like at the railway stations?

Scaffolding is spreading!

Work has started on the extensive renovation work at St. Edward's Church as can be seen from the scaffolding starting to rise up the tower. Two other renovating works on properties on the High Street make it a centre of construction activity which will give great interest to us all. All three buildings are important in the history of the village and make central contributions to its character. It's not cheap to keep up these elderly buildings so we should thank those responsible for keeping them in good condition.

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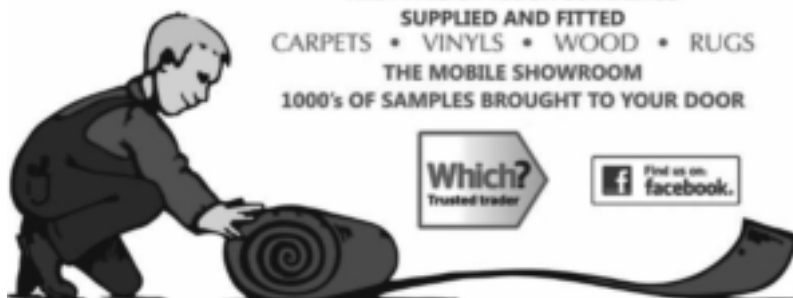
