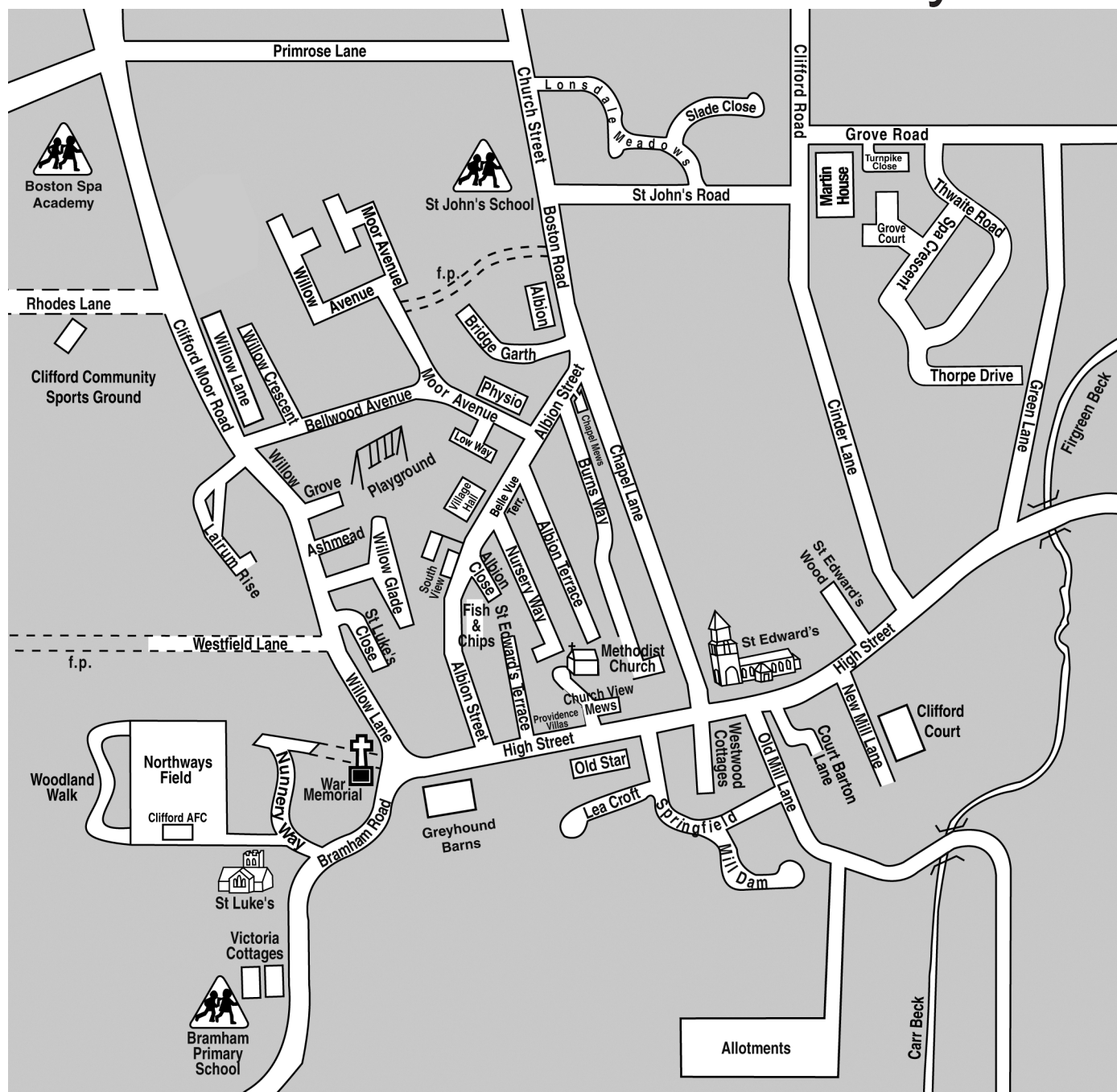

# Clifford Outlook 50<sup>th</sup> Year

Continuing our theme of 50 years of the Outlook Magazine...

Below are two items from 2005

From Issue No. 351 February 2005

## UNEARTHING HIDDEN TREASURES

A Time Capsule, buried for more than 80 years was unearthed by the builders working on the site of the former convent school buildings in Clifford. It was buried in the foundations of one of the convent school buildings and consisted of the Catholic Newspaper "The Universe", rosary beads and religious coins. As well as these there was a copy of the Daily News dated July 8th 1923, where the headline reported Suzanne Lenglen's seventh Wimbledon win.

The Managing Director of Barretts, York, presented the contents of the Time Capsule to Canon Hugh J. Barr of St Edward's Church, Clifford. Mr Reed said that the history of the site was most interesting, that it was wonderful to find the Time Capsule, which had lain hidden for more than 80 years, and it seemed fitting to return the contents to the Catholic Church.

Canon Barr will be presenting the contents of the Time Capsule to Sister Imelda, a former head mistress of the convent school, and Sister Mary Kevin, now 98 years old, both of whom now live in a convent in Doncaster.

From Issue No. 358 September 2005 – an extract from the obituary of Jack Billingsby who had been landlord of the Old Star for over 20 years and, by all accounts, was a bit of a character...

Soon after arriving, Jack started the Old Star Quizzes. He had a unique skill as a Question Master, brooking no arguments or queries about questions or answers. His motto - "Rule One – The Question Master is always right – Rule Two – see Rule One!"

There was a football team, tug of war, barbecues and of course the MacMillan nurses annual walk, ironically in aid of cancer relief. Jack was very fond of music and was a past brass bandsman. On Sunday mornings there would be a record recital of brass band music.

The parties were legendary. As well as the Bonfire Night party, and the Old Folks Christmas party, there were the Saturday night Cheese parties. Everyone would take a different cheese, Doreen would provide the biscuits, and everyone tucked in, washed down with plenty of liquid refreshment.

Then there were the Dripping parties – a bowl of dripping, everyone dipping in to the pot to spread it on new bread supplied by Doreen. The "meaty jelly" bit at the bottom of the bowl was the speciality. All a good excuse for drinking the beer.

Many folk will remember the Maggot Racing. Containers of maggots were obtained from the local Angler's shop. Derek Pullen made the race track from a piece of board about 18 inches wide by a yard or so long. Lanes were delineated, and a mirror was placed at the far end to attract the maggots to "run" towards it. Bets were placed, but fortunes were not made, only lots of laughter.

## Green Bin Recycling with Leeds City Council

In May this year I visited, together with u3a Environment Group, the Leeds Material Recycling Facility in Beeston. They currently have the contract to sort the rubbish that we put into our green bins which are supplied by the council.

We were all shocked to see the amount (and the smell!) of the contents of our bins which were tipped into a large area before being sorted by different means, (another story!) into a product that is then traded on the open market.

A very pleasant woman took us round and explained some of the problems that are currently becoming worse, particularly the type of rubbish that is appearing in the green bins. She said they were finding soiled nappies, vapes, batteries, clothing, food waste and other items that should be nowhere near a green bin. It makes the whole sorting process more complex and often whole loads are contaminated and useless for recycling. At the moment, the situation is worse than a few years ago, the amount of non recyclable material in green bins has increased from 5% to 20%.

The council does issue leaflets about recycling, I have the current one pinned up in my kitchen. She said a rule of thumb was, if unsure, put the item into the black bin which goes to the incinerator.

If you have transport, you can, of course, go to the tip at Thorp Arch (Household Waste Site) where there are all sorts of containers for different types of waste.

Another issue was glass. As you all know, you can now put glass bottles in the green bin. We had wondered how it was dealt with-it is crushed and the shards treated at another of their plants. We were told it was much more efficient if glass was taken, if possible, to Thorp Arch Tip.

So please can we all make an effort and try to use less plastic and other problem materials and, most importantly, use the bins correctly.

# Clifford Local History Group

## Outlook Magazine – ‘The Early Years’

With Outlook now in its 50<sup>th</sup> year, we in the History Group thought it might be interesting to read through the first 10 years’ of publications to see what interesting tidbits could be shared.

Surprisingly, the early years of the Outlook magazine read very much like current Facebook ‘Grumbler’ pages, where residents would regularly send letters (leaving them in a specific box held at the village Post Office) for publication in the following month’s publication – editions are filled with complaints over litter, dog fouling, children climbing walls into gardens to steal fruit while trampling flowers, and complaints about noisy motorbikes and drivers exceeding speed limits. We often think of issues such as these as being a new problem – but alas no! I wonder how many of today’s ‘Grumblers’ are yesterday’s trouble makers ?!

It’s interesting to note that every edition would contain letters from the local clergy, with representation from the Methodist, Catholic, and Protestant churches – this tie to the local churches could also be seen in the logo of the magazine which was a crucifix form of the words “Clifford Outlook” (the “I” being shared by both words where they intersected) until 1981 when it shifted to an early version of the map which fronts today’s versions.

There were regular sections from ‘David’s Dodges’ – offering handy tips (life-hacks in today’s lingo) such as how to open a bottle of wine with a screw, screwdriver, and pliers & the advice to hide a car key behind the hubcap or bumper of your car should you find yourself locked out (Ed. – not advised in today’s world of Keyless entry!!).

Local groups were also regular contributors as they are today – you’d recognise the entries from Clifford Drama Group, but what about the ‘Cine’ group, Cubs, Scouts, and the WI? May 1982 saw what could be considered to be the first shoots of a Local History Group – with Pauline Winterburn (who remains a member of the History Group) enquiring as to the history of the Villages churches, mills, and pubs. Responses to which were published in subsequent months.

These early years also tell us that local Brownies, Cubs, and Scouts planted over 2000 daffodils around the village in ’78 and ’79 – it’s possible that some of these can still be seen in areas such as around the War Memorial and on Northways.

In January of 1978 a letter was sent thanking “Geoff Barker” and pals for setting up an emergency volunteer fire service in the village – does anybody know what happened to this? Did they ever see any action?

There are also regular letters and updates about the potential to have a footpath to the now demolished Clifford Primary School – yet more proof that nothing changes, with the recent addition of the footpath at Bramham Primary School following months of work!

Those familiar with the work of Simon Pegg and Nick Frost of Cornetto Trilogy fame will know about “the Greater Good” – rest assured (?) that the same logic was applied by West Yorkshire Police in May of 1978. When pushed to act on the use of ‘noisy motorbikes in the quarry’ (believed to be the quarry that used to be near The Willows) they responded that they had not acted as they “thought they were better there than on the road”!

To end, a question - there was mention in January of ’76 of a Jack Russell-Yorkshire Terrier called Spot who went missing on 2<sup>nd</sup> December of ’75 – does anyone know if he was ever found?

### **Rhodes Lane**

A site meeting has taken place on Rhodes Lane to consider road safety issues raised by several residents. Ward Cllr Stables, representatives from the Parish Council and LCC Highways attended. LCC Highways are considering several actions including: cutting back hedges to improve visibility, improving the road surface, widening the road and installing speed signs. The Parish Council will forward data from the mobile SID about vehicle numbers and speeds on Rhodes Lane. LCC Highways will consider reducing the speed limit to 20 mph.

### **Leeds Local Plan Consultation**

Leeds City Council is currently reviewing its Local Plan – the key document that sets out how land across the area will be used for things like housing, employment, transport, and green space in the years ahead. As part of this review, a Call for Sites plan has now been published, and LCC will be holding a public consultation over the summer.

This is a vital opportunity for residents to help shape the future of Clifford. The Local Plan guides decisions on where new homes might be built, which areas should be protected from development, where new roads and schools could go, and how we tackle climate change locally. This is a chance for all residents to get involved in shaping how Clifford looks, feels, and functions over the next 10, 15, or even 20 years.

### **Dog Fouling**

Would the person who is allowing their dog to continually foul the area near the plant outside Clifford Methodist Chapel please refrain from doing so. It would appear to be the same dog on many occasions and the owner must realise this is happening. Many thanks.

## **Gardener's Corner- for owners of a window ledge, patio or a fully flung outdoor space!**

**Happy July everyone!!** If you are looking for a plant to fill a space and add height, consider introducing some globe artichokes or cardoons into your borders or vegetable garden. They bring architectural drama with their silver toothed foliage for many months of the year and delicious round artichoke flower heads in the summer.

Globe artichokes can be grown from seed or by taking offsets from the sides of existing plants. It is a perennial (coming back every year) and so you will need to prepare the ground. Dig in well rotted manure or compost and add grit and leaf mould to help drainage in heavy soils.

Sow seeds indoors in pots in March or April on a warm windowsill, then plant out in mid- late May. Cut off any flowers in the first summer so that they can become stronger plants. In late autumn remove old stems and dead foliage, and mulch thickly with straw or autumn leaves.

### **To do now**

- Eat outside and enjoy the outdoor space- make the most of all your work so far, looking after and growing plants
- Water containers, and use whatever you can to conserve water, perhaps put a mulch such as bark chips or gravel, onto the soil.
- Move plants that may suffer from excessive heat or direct sunlight, into the shadier places around your house
- If you don't have one already get a water butt installed
- Prune ornamental and fruiting cherry and plum trees. Winter pruning can lead to sap leaking
- Hedges that need trimming can be done, now that the nesting birds have flown
- Sow lettuce every 2 weeks- you can do this in a pot on your windowsill, in prepared ground or in a raised bed. This will give you a crop over the next weeks
- No space outside? Try a new herb or two to have on your windowsill. Maybe rosemary, thyme, chives, dill or fennel. There are many ideas and recipes for using them online or social media.

**Future proofing** Have a walk around your space and do a 'summer review'. Make a note of what is great and what is not so great. If you have any spaces, plan for what you could fill it with next year. The catalogues/online shops are out now for autumn planted bulbs, so you can even start thinking about some new ones to try.

**Mindful moment** I really believe that getting outside- or even indoors with the window open- and tending any plants, can boost both your mood and your physical fitness. And some of you will already know the expression for gardening as 'the green gym'. Here are some benefits of gardening:

- improved strength and stamina
- calorie burning
- relaxation
- better movement and balance
- a healthier heart

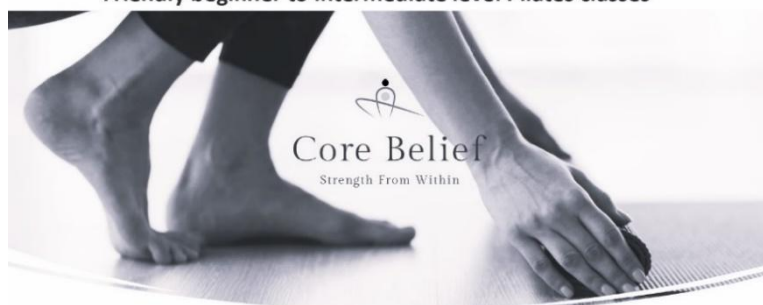

## OUT AND ABOUT

### Wild Clifford

We are all aware of the recent very dry weather in April and May with gardeners and farmers concerned about its effect on flowers and crops. So it came as something of a surprise on a visit to Northways and St. Edward's wood areas to see that they are nevertheless so prolific and profuse in their continual 'wilding'. The central growth at the wood is now very strong with some fruit trees within the wild patch. Some of the older apple trees have branches bent down from previous years and look to be repeating the performance this year. Hopefully the crop will be the same again and will be enjoyed by those who pick them. St. Edward's wood has a new fence between itself and the churchyard. The boundary to the north has been reduced giving a better view towards Boston Spa and the whole plot is beginning to look more open.

At Northways the trees planted almost twenty years ago are becoming something of a minor forest. Bird song has increased during its lifetime. Its informal management has resulted in the creation of various equally informal paths through it. The area nearest to St. Luke's church where there are very tall poplar trees, now well over 50 years old, is completely covered by petasites otherwise known as butterbur or winter heliotrope. Don't nick a bit for your garden as it will cover everything else very quickly. Elsewhere in recent weeks we have had cow parsley which Monty Don praises for his garden even though some class it as a weed. Another prominent one has been cleavers with its tiny white flowers followed by the 'sticky buds'. Prettier is pink campion. What else can you find? Enjoy sitting on the benches to watch the wildness. Don't let the A1(M) spoil the 'mindfulness'. Think of its original name - Great North Road.

### Corner Cottage

Work seems to be proceeding on renovation of this long-standing Clifford house which has a remnant linked to the historic 'toft and croft' part of the village. It's in a prominent position on the busy road to Bramham so it is one of the first buildings that people visiting our village encounter. It has been unoccupied for quite a long time. It will be good to see it returned to its previous appearance.

## CLIFFORD WALKERS OUTING 15<sup>TH</sup> MAY ADDINGHAM

Twelve members of the walking group gathered in Addingham, a village next to Ilkley. As is becoming the case these days there were more ladies (8) than men (4). Come on chaps and join in for enjoyable and interesting days out! We left our cars and crossed the footbridge over the river Wharfe on a largely cloudy day. We wondered how long it would take the water under us to reach Boston Spa. Probably not suitable for playing pooh sticks!

We soon found ourselves on a quiet well-surfaced road obviously very popular with cyclists. We soon arrived at the village of Nesfield where there was an interesting bit of history as described on the plaque reminding us of how the postal service used to be. The shelter and its surroundings provided a welcome coffee stop. Continuing on the road we then reached the one and only serious climb of the day. Most stiles were well-kept and offered no problem. Among us we saw wild life of hare, deer and, above us, a buzzard. Carrying on through the lovely countryside we eventually reached the outskirts of Ilkley with its grand houses. We made our way, via bridges, to the park at the town side of the river where we stopped for lunch. It's a lucky town to have such an open space for residents to enjoy.



We returned to Addingham along the Dales Way, partly alongside the river. In the village we passed a house, formerly a mill, with its adjacent weir indicating that it had a water-wheel for power. So Clifford and Addingham have something historical in common. On the way home we then gathered at a new Garden Centre at Ilkley - Moss and Moor - for an enjoyable tea and cake. 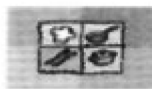
