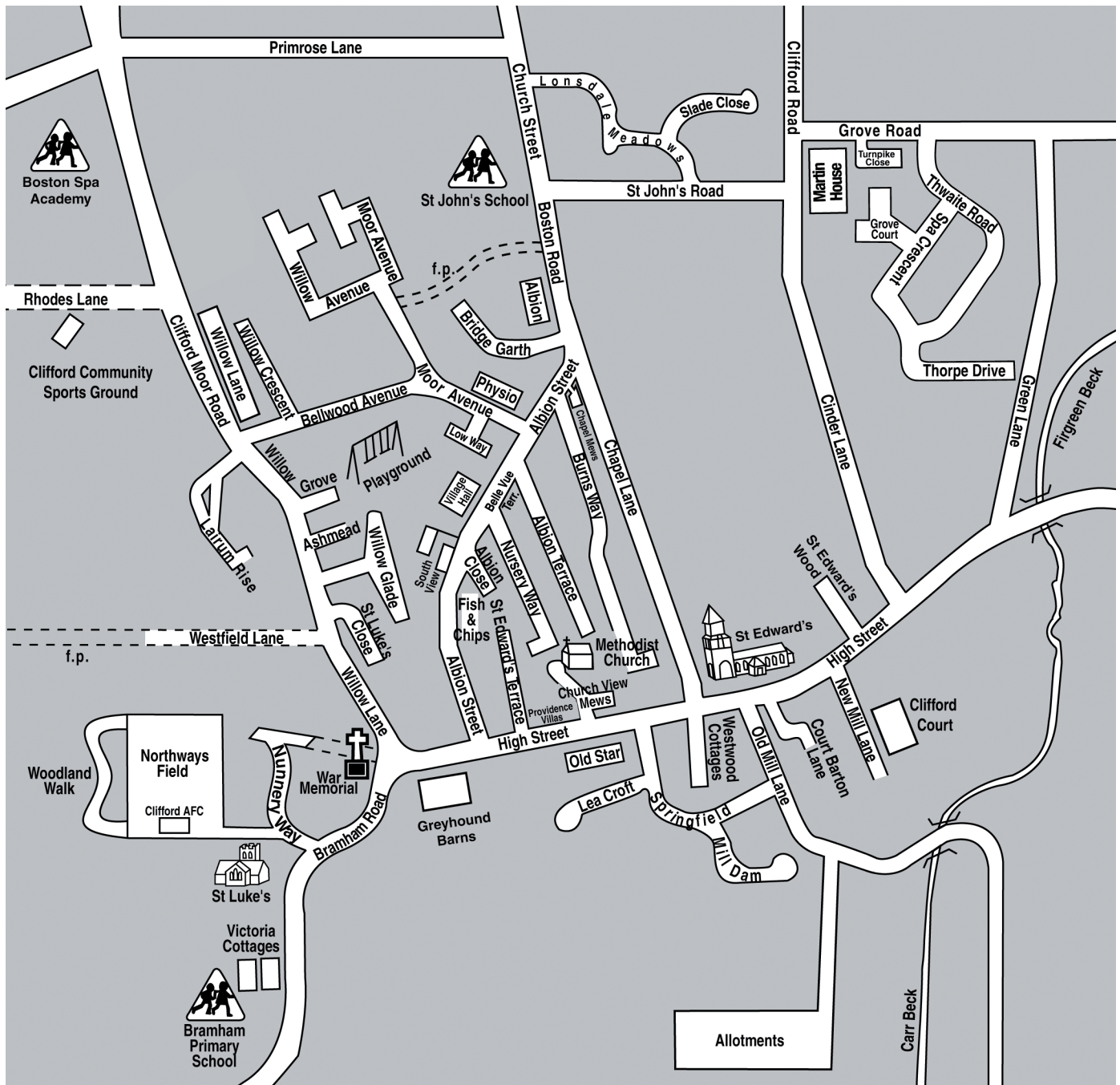

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CLIFFORD WALKING GROUP – Report from July Walk

On 16th July, 13 Clifford Walkers set off on an amazing circular walk from Starbotton to Kettlewell.

The day was hot and sunny and the birds were calling and singing as we set off beside the River Wharfe. We actually saw a heron; and two oystercatchers were really telling us off with all their squawking for being too nearby and, of course, we heard the haunting call of the Dales majestic bird the curlew. No stops for coffee as we had our coffee time at the start on the benches outside the Fox and Hounds and our lunch stop would be at the church in Kettlewell.

Before we got to Kettlewell we wandered through clouds of meadowsweet, delicate harebells, purple knapweed and cranesbill, yellow evening primrose all being visited with bees and colourful butterflies.

Lunch was at St Mary's, the churchyard all set out more like a garden with overflowing flower beds and sculptural rocks with plaques instead of concrete headstones. Also in the church grounds was a labyrinth to walk around and seek tranquillity, peace and meditation.

After lunch the majority of walkers had an ice cream in order to cool off. The group then split in half with 6 walkers returning back along the river and the other 7 opting to take the higher route in order to see more scenic higher views.

A great circular walk and then onto our annual meal at the Fox and Hounds where we were joined by 2 more Cliffordians.

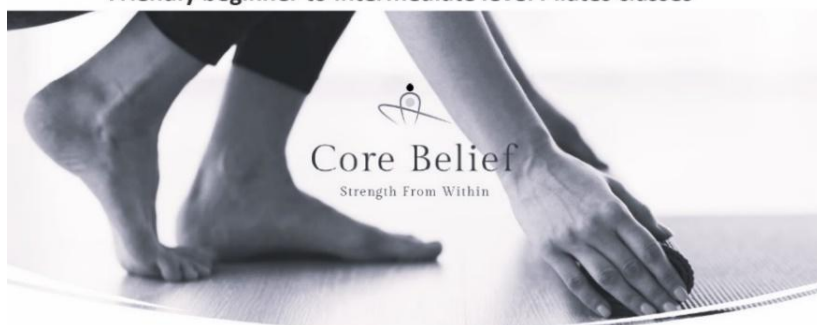

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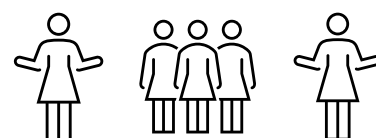

Clifford Parish Council

The Parish Council meets on the 3rd Wednesday of the month at 7.30 pm at Clifford Village Hall.
The remaining meeting dates for 2026 are: September 16th, October 21st, November 18th and December 16th.

July 2026 meeting

Tree Works Councillors have undertaken an inspection of the trees at Northways and noted several trees are starting to overhang the football field. There are also several dead or diseased trees. Quotes for the necessary tree works will be considered at the September meeting.

Clifford Moor Road There have been at least 4 burst water mains on Clifford Moor Road in recent years. The Council understands that the mains pipe needs to be replaced but this was not done before the road was resurfaced. There is a risk of the road surface deteriorating if the mains pipe bursts again and the Council will raise this with LCC.

Land off South View It was agreed to request permission from the Village Hall Trustees to allow access to the Land off South View from the Village Hall carpark for pedestrians and maintenance vehicles. A draft Memorandum of Agreement was approved and has been sent to the Village Hall Trustees for their consideration.

Clifford Parish Council

Have you ever wondered what Clifford Parish Council does? The Council is the tier of local government closest to residents, with nine elected councillors who give their time to represent the community and help make maintain and improve Clifford for the benefit of all residents.

What does the Parish Council do?

The Parish Council maintains and improves Parish Council owned/leased land and facilities, supports local projects and community organisations, comments on planning applications, arranges community events and works to protect and improve Clifford.

The Parish Council is funded mainly through the Parish Precept, which is collected by Leeds City Council with the Council Tax. The Council also receive grants and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money from local development.

Working with Leeds City Council

Clifford Parish Council and Leeds City Council have different responsibilities. Leeds City Council provides many of the larger services residents rely on, including waste collection, highways, street lighting and making the final decisions on planning applications.

The Parish Council is consulted on planning applications in Clifford and submits its comments to LCC after considering the views of residents. The Council also works with LCC on matters such as footpaths, traffic management and community facilities.

Looking after Clifford's assets

The Parish Council is responsible for several important local assets, including the Clifford Community Sports Ground, facilities and land at Northways, St Edward's Field, the Land off South View, the allotments and the Clifford War Memorial. The Parish Council funds grass cutting, tree works and other maintenance to keep these areas safe and attractive for residents to enjoy.

Projects for the community

The Parish Council regularly invests in projects which benefit residents. The Parish Council has committed up to £60,000 towards the redevelopment of the playground at the Village Hall, which will provide improved and more accessible play equipment for children.

Clifford Local History Group Mediaeval Clifford: Lords of Clifford

In addition to the grants of land discussed in the previous article in this series (see *Outlook* 603, February 2026), the *Coucher Book of Kirkstall Abbey* contained an account of a number of the lords who held Clifford. That account records that at one time Clifford was held by a Robert de Birdsall. Robert had one daughter, Sarah, who was his heiress and who married a man named Anketin Malory. Anketin and Sarah had six children, two sons and four daughters. One of those sons, also called Anketin, is stated to have died without an heir. The other son, Nicolas, is stated to have died overseas. As a result, Clifford was divided between the four daughters: Marjory (with her husband, Ralph Salvayn), Avicia (with her husband William Birdon), Collecta (with her husband Nicholas of Okelthosthorp) and Sarah. This Sarah was married first to a Walter of Grimston and subsequently to William of Glenton. Sarah and William sold their portion of Clifford to Adam of Potterton, the rector of the church of Barwick. Adam of Potterton then gave that part of Clifford to Dukettus of Clifford "with his daughter".

The *Coucher Book* does not give any dates, but from other sources we know that Anketin Malory was alive and probably an adult by 1229, when it is recorded that Henry III commuted certain of Anketin's debts to Aron, a Jew from York. Anketin Malory was appointed keeper of the bishopric of Salisbury in 1246, responsible for administering the church estates there on behalf of the king while the office of bishop was vacant.

It appears that the *Coucher Book* missed some generations of the de Birdsall family. Robert de Birdsall is recorded as a vassal of William Fossard in 1166. Robert's son was called Adam, who died before his son and heir had reached majority. That son is recorded as being a ward of the king in 1216, when his lands in Clifford were valued at four marks (which was equal to £2 13s 4d or £2 and 65²/₃ p in new money). Anketin Malory is described on several occasions as being the husband of the daughter and heir of a William of Mulethorpe (Mowthorpe, in the North Riding). Robert de Birdsall and his successors also held Mowthorpe, and Anketin and Sarah did not inherit Birdsall, which appears to have escheated (reverted) to the superior lord following the death of Sarah's father. It is probable that the son of Adam de Birdsall, who was ward of the king in 1216, is the William of Mulethorpe named as Antekin Malory's father-in-law.

Nicolas Malory died some time shortly before 1275. King Edward I returned from crusade in 1274. Given the *Coucher Book's* reference to Nicolas having died overseas, it is possible that it was on that crusade that he died.

Ralph Salvayn and Marjory had a son, whom they named Anketin. He is recorded as having died in 1282, leaving a pregnant wife and dying in the arms of his servant, William de Berewik of Clifford. Anketin Salvayn's posthumous son was also named Anketin.

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A Drought of times past

The drought of summer 1874, an account from Mr H T Clarke, of Clifford Moor:

The season has been one of great drought; water-lending has been the rule. On the light limestone soils all corn crops have suffered from the dry weather, more especially oats.

There are a few patches of turnips, which will be improved by last Tuesday's rain.

This week (6th August) we began harvest. There was a full breadth of wheat sown in the autumn and very little at spring. Barley and oats occupy a full quantity of land this season. Mangolds are of fair promise. Swedes and white turnips are bad.

Potatoes are good. Wheat is an average crop, also barley, but oats are one-third. Under an average quantity of stock has been grassed, and the hay crop is very light. There are a few fields of flax, but it is short in the straw and a light crop.

Lambs are considerably lower than last year.
